


## Experimenter 1 Surveying Example

For the surveying experiments, I tried both Mentimeter and Microsoft Forms.

### A. Mentimeter (October 16, 2021)

#### What I learned:

- Mentimeter automatically generates a QR code, making it easier for mobile devices with camera to participate.
- Mentimeter is a great tool for interactive surveys that collects answers one slide at a time. It is not ideal for surveys with multiple questions because the participants have to wait for the next slide to appear.


## B. Microsoft Forms (July 21, 2021)

- Microsoft Forms is available to Office 365 Education customers.


### Steps:

1. In Microsoft Forms, create a new form and add the survey questions
2. Share the survey link to collect information. E.g., <https://forms.office.com/r/<gS4c6CmnUZ>>
  - a. The form is publicly accessible
