

Module 1: Teacher for Learning

Summary:

Providing patient education is important because it increases a patient's ability and willingness to comply to treatment. Providing health-teaching allows patients to make informed decisions about their care and promotes higher patient satisfaction. As nurses, it is our responsibility to provide patients with the appropriate education and ensure that information provided is evidence-based and accurate. It is also important to ensure learners have a safe, private, and comfortable space to learn. Furthermore, evaluating the effectiveness of learning is necessary to confirm that learning was successful.

3. Reflection – Process & Application

I am privileged to have had the opportunity to participate in post-secondary education where I was able to expand on my knowledge & skills in notetaking as well as the use of technology (i.e., typing fast, taking keynotes). Typically, over the years, I have adapted my own method of taking notes... as in, I just type what I hear and try to listen for key words. However, I have never used the Cornell Note-Taking method.

I find the Cornell-Note Taking template useful because it keeps everything together. The course, the title, contact info, the main questions/ideas, and then our own notes are all essential components of efficient notetaking. The part I found the most beneficial was the summary. I've never thought about creating a few sentences to summarize the key points *during* notetaking. This was helpful because while I was writing each sentence, I was arranging the information in the same way I arranged the key points. This made is easier for me to understand the benefits of patient education, as well as recall the major components required to provide effective patient education and ultimately, enhance patient compliance.
